I am pleased to sign into law this resolution CJY-51-23 approving the Fiscal Recovery Funds Delegate Regional Project Plan for Honorable Daniel's Delegate Region in the amount of \$2,405,791.34.

My Administration supports the plans of these Chapters who have worked very hard to put together their Regional Plans and is working very closely with the Fiscal Recovery Fund Office to ensure that these funds are put to use. As such, when Chapters are running into roadblocks in expending their Fiscal Recovery Funds and the roadblock is coming from the Executive Branch, I encourage them to reach out to the Office of the President and Vice President and inform my office of the roadblock and we will work to overcome those roadblocks.

I do want to take the moment to express my concern that any amendments to the Regional Plans must be approved by the Council. In addition, the prior Navajo Nation Council has set the expectation that Fiscal Recovery Funds be encumbered by June 30, 2024. This deadline is not far off. As a construction expert, I know that there are unpredictable factors that can prevent even the best of plans from moving forward on the proposed timeline. We should be designing systems that are flexible, accountable, and transparent. We do not currently have that system and I look forward to working with you and the entire Council to improve the Navajo Nation systems, so we are supporting our communities to take advantage of this historic funding.

Now let's get to work!

### AN ACTION

RELATING TO THE NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE AND NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; AMENDING CAP-21-23, THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND DELEGATE REGION PROJECT PLAN FOR HONORABLE HERMAN M. DANIELS, JR.'S DELEGATE REGION (CHAPTERS: TSAH BII KIN, NAVAJO MOUNTAIN, SHONTO, OLJATO), TO INCLUDE ADDITIONAL PROJECTS FOR THIS DELEGATE REGION

### BE IT ENACTED:

### SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. The Navajo Nation Council is the governing body of the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. § 102(A).
- B. The Naabik'íyáti' Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council with the delegated responsibility to hear proposed resolution(s) that require final action by the Navajo Nation Council. 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(9).
- C. Navajo Nation Council Resolution No. CJN-29-22, incorporated herein by reference, mandates that Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund ("NNFRF") Delegate Region Project Plans be approved by Navajo Nation Council resolution and signed into law by the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).
- D. Navajo Nation Council Resolution No. CAP-21-23, herein by reference, mandates that amendments to the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund Delegate Region Project Plan for Honorable Herman M. Daniels, Jr.'s Delegate Region (Chapter: Tsah Bii Kin, Navajo Mountain, Shonto, Oljato) be approved by a Navajo Nation Council resolution and signed into law by the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(17), and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).

### SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

A. The Navajo Nation Council Resolution No. CJN-29-22, AN ACTION RELATING TO THE NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE AND NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; ALLOCATING \$1,070,298,867 OF NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS; APPROVING THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND EXPENDITURE PLANS FOR: CHAPTER AND REGIONAL PROJECTS; PUBLIC SAFETY EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS, E911, AND RURAL ADDRESSING PROJECTS; CYBER SECURITY; PUBLIC HEALTH PROJECTS; HARDSHIP ASSISTANCE; WATER AND WASTEWATER PROJECTS; BROADBAND

PROJECTS; HOME ELECTRICITY CONNECTION AND ELECTRIC CAPACITY PROJECTS; HOUSING PROJECTS AND MANUFACTURED HOUSING FACILITIES; BATHROOM ADDITION PROJECTS; CONSTRUCTION CONTINGENCY FUNDING; AND REDUCED ADMINISTRATIVE FUNDING, was signed into law by the President of the Navajo Nation on July 15, 2022.

- B. CJN-29-22, Section Three, states, in part and among other things, that
  - 1. The Navajo Nation hereby approves total funding for the NNFRF Chapter and Chapter Projects Expenditure Plan from the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund in the total amount of two hundred eleven million two hundred fifty-six thousand one hundred forty-eight dollars (\$211,256,148) to be divided equally between the twenty-four (24) Delegate Regions in the amount of eight million eight hundred two thousand three hundred forty dollars (\$8,802,340) per Delegate Region . . . and allocated through Delegate Region Project Plans approved by Navajo Nation Council resolution and signed into law by the President of the Navajo Nation . . . . See CJN-29-22, Section Three (B).
  - 2. The Delegate Region Project Plan funding will be allocated to the Navajo Nation Central Government, specifically the Division of Community Development or other appropriate Navajo Nation Division or Department, to implement the projects rather than directly to the Chapters. See CJN-29-22, Section Three (D).
  - 3. The Navajo Nation Central Government, specifically the Division of Community Development or other appropriate Navajo Nation Division or Department, shall manage and administer funds and Delegate Region Project Plans on behalf of Non-LGA-Certified Chapters. The Navajo Nation Central Government may award funding to LGA-Certified Chapters through sub-recipient agreements to implement and manage specific projects, but shall maintain Administrative Oversight over such funding and Delegate Region Project Plans. See CJN-29-22, Section Three (E).
  - 4. Each Navajo Nation Council delegate shall select Fiscal Recovery Fund eligible projects within their Delegate Region to be funded by the NNFRF Chapter and Regional Projects Expenditure Plan through a Delegate Region Projects Plan. The total cost of projects selected by each Delegate shall not exceed their Delegate Region distribution of eight million eight hundred two thousand three hundred forty dollars (\$8,802,340). See CJN-29-22, Section Three (F).

- 5. Each Delegate Region Project shall identify its Administrative Oversight entity and its Oversight Committee(s) and be subject CJY-41-21's NNDOJ initial eligibility determination. See CJN-29-22, Section Three (L)(5) and (L)(6).
- C. The Navajo Nation Council Resolution No. CAP-21-23, AN ACTION RELATING TO THE NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE AND NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; APPROVING THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND DELEGATE REGION PROJECT PLAN FOR HONORABLE HERMAN M. DANIELS, JR.'S DELEGATE REGION (CHAPTERS: TSAH BII KIN, NAVAJO MOUNTAIN, SHONTO, OLJATO), was signed into law by the President of the Navajo Nation on May 5, 2023.
- D. CAP-21-23, Section Four, states that:
  - 1. Amendments to this legislation or to the Delegate Region Project Plan approved herein shall only be adopted by resolution of the Navajo Nation Council and approval of the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).
- E. All additional projects listed in the Hon. Herman M. Daniels, Jr.'s Delegate Region Projects Plan, attached as Exhibit A, have been deemed Fiscal Recovery Fund eligible by NNDOJ. In addition, Hon. Herman M. Daniels, Jr.'s Delegate Region Projects Plan does not exceed the amount of \$8,802,340, as set forth in CJN-29-22, Section Three (F).
- F. The Navajo Nation Council hereby finds that it is in the best interest of the Navajo Nation and the Hon. Herman M. Daniels, Jr.'s Delegate Region Chapters and communities to approve and adopt the additional projects as part of the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund Delegate Region Project Plan for Hon. Herman M. Daniels, Jr.'s Delegate Region (Chapters: Tsah Bii Kin, Navajo Mountain, Shonto, Oljato) as set forth in Exhibit A.

SECTION THREE. AMENDING CAP-21-23, THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND DELEGATE REGION PROJECT PLAN FOR HONORABLE HERMAN M. DANIELS, JR.'S DELEGATE REGION (CHAPTERS: TSAH BII KIN, NAVAJO MOUNTAIN, SHONTO, OLJATO), TO INCLUDE ADDITIONAL PROJECTS FOR THIS DELEGATE REGION

A. The Navajo Nation hereby approves the additional projects as part of the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund Delegate Region Project Plan for Hon. Herman M. Daniels, Jr.'s Delegate Region (Chapters: Tsah Bii Kin, Navajo Mountain, Shonto, Oljato) set forth in Exhibit A.

- B. The Delegate Region Project Plan approved herein shall comply with all applicable provisions of CJY-41-21, CJN-29-22, and BFS-31-21.
- C. Any inconsistencies between this legislation, the Delegate Region Project Plan, and the individual project appendix, shall be resolved in favor of the project appendix reviewed by Department of Justice during their eligibility determination(s).

### SECTION FOUR. AMENDMENTS

Amendments to this legislation or to the Delegate Region Project Plan approved herein shall only be adopted by resolution of the Navajo Nation Council and approval of the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).

### SECTION FIVE. EFFECTIVE DATE

This legislation shall be effective upon its approval pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 221(B), 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(17), and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).

### SECTION SIX. SAVING CLAUSE

If any provision of this legislation is determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, or by a Navajo Nation District Court without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, those provisions of this legislation not determined invalid shall remain the law of the Navajo Nation.

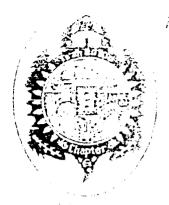

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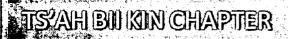

### I. Abstract

The scattered house wiring and power line extension project upon completion will provide a power source to homes where medications can be refrigerated for those individuals that are required to store their medications related to their illnesses. Further, having this much needed amenity would also give our constituents the ability to operate oxygen concentrator equipment for their individual needs. In addition, the power source will prevent the spoilage of perishable foods, lighting for youth to study in the evening so that they are successful in their educational endeavors, and home lighting outside the homes will enable visibility during the night especially for those with vision impairment.

### il. Introduction

### Primary Intent and Outcome of the Project

The intent of the project is to increase the standard of living condition for all residents of Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter by providing the needed and reliable power source to refrigerate medication for community members who are diabetic, preventing spoilage of perishable foods, operation of oxygen concentrator equipment for those with a respiratory condition. In addition, give all an opportunity to increase their life expectancy, increase visibility at night, and maximize student academic achievement.

### **History of the Planned Project**

Under the direction of the chapter officials a multiyear priority list has been established with regard to the development of main infrastructures (power line extensions, solid waste station, waste water provisions, road improvement, erosion control, and housing) within the chapter community to better address the constituents' needs in this sparsely populated community.

Beginning with 2010, the chapter has established a five year phase in project plan for the power line extension and electrification projects, which will accommodate regionalized areas of the chapter community due to its vastness. Recently, Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter had secured funds from the Sihasin Funds in the amount of \$1.4M dollars for three projects, house wiring, electrification, and solid waste transfer station. Currently the house wiring has been completed and next is to start the electrification distribution. Formerly, the chapter was also successful in obtaining funds from the Abandoned Mine Land (AML) for house wiring projects; Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter has paid \$92,383.20 to Navajo Tribal Utility for the Tohajichi'li Power Line Project for the acquisition of an Easement for a Right of Way.

Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter has budgeted funds in Fiscal Year 2012 to have the project construction ready. As with previous project experiences, the chapter officials and staff are collaborating and coordinating with all applicable entities to meet all requirements and specifications to complete the proposed power line extension project. The proposal for the Ts'ah Bii Kin Power Line Extension and Electrification Project has been completed and turned in. As of proposal date, Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter has allocated matching funds in the amount of \$96,925.00. Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter Staff and representatives from Navajo Tribal Utility Authority have met and completed a Feasibility Study on the Proposed Project.

In this current proposal, the objective is to electrify every home in the Ts'ah Bii Kin community whether they may only need a power line extension or both, a power line extension and their home wired. As oppose to the past where electrification and house wiring were completed by areas, recently with the Tohajichi'li Power Line Extension and Electrification Project and earlier with the Whirlwind Rock Power Line Project. In analyzing the needs of the community, those with immediate needs such as the disabled, the elderly, and school age children are spread throughout the community, therefore electrifying Ts'ah Bii Kin community by areas is not feasible because that would mean choosing and meeting the needs of one community over another.

### **Funding Agency Background Information**

Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter, through hard work and persistency, is making advances to address the needs of the local constituents. Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter utilizes the Five Management System for direction and guidance to remain in compliance. Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter has never been sanctioned for misuse of funds by the tribe and/or by the federal government. All proceeds related to the projects will be contracted to the NTUA for engineering and construction services in a timely manner to expend federal funds.

### III. Needs for and Goals of Project

### **Need for the Project**

Without a doubt, the project when completed will enrich the standard of living conditions for all residents by addressing their basic needs: in refrigeration of medication particularly for those with diabetic condition, the operation of oxygen concentrator equipment for those with lung conditions, the safeguarding and keeping of perishable food resulting in a reduction in trips to the store and cost savings on fuel for low income families.

The accessibility to electricity will allow students in the Ts'ah Bii Kin community to further their educational endeavors because the students are utilizing unreliable solar, kerosene lanterns, and oil lanterns to light their homes. With candles and

kerosene lanterns they provide a low-quality light source, making it difficult for children to read and do homework.

Third, the use of kerosene is harmful because simple kerosene lanterns where exposed to particulate matter concentrations significantly greater than the amount present in the ambient air such exposure can present long-term health risks. Kerosene lanterns also produce CO2 emissions, causing harm to the environment. The average kerosene lantern, when used for four hours per night, produces over 100 kilograms of CO2 emissions per year.

### People to be serviced

A total of approximately 55 occupants in 22 scattered homes located within roughly 100 square miles in the Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter community. All 22 Ts'ah Bii Kin residents are in need of power line extension to their homes, and of these 22 applicants 5 have become deceased, 6 applicants are in need of house wiring. Of these 22 applicants, 8 of the applicants being elderly, 4 of the applicants being disabled, 22 school age children, and finally, other individuals who are not under any of these categories. Of the applicants, 65 percent of the applicants are a special population that are in need of electricity due to their age, their disability, or for their education.

### The Impact and Benefits of the Project

The impact and benefits of the proposed power line extension for Ts'ah Bii Kin will have multiple influential impacts on individuals, and families. First the rate of recurrence by individuals with health related conditions will be reduced. In fact, the positive effects will filter to the outside entities such as Indian Health Service clinics and hospitals by reduction of outpatient visits. Those being serviced will be able to refrigerate their medication particularly for those with diabetes condition, those with lung conditions utilizing oxygen concentrator equipment, and finally, the safeguarding and keeping of perishable food, which will reduce frequent trips to the store and cost savings on fuel for low income families.

Second, the electrification of homes will allow students to use electricity to enhance their studies. And it allows for increased access to media and also, educational benefits from higher educational attainment by students of electrified households, which results in higher future earnings. With the Ts'ah Bii Kin community being remote, access to post-secondary educational institutions is nonexistent, therefore community members turn to post-secondary institutions with online programs. With online programs, access to a wireless network is needed because much of the communication between their professor and the student is online. Also, online classes require classroom materials to be accessed online and submitted online. Also, due to significant population of Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter lacks electricity, any document scanning, copying, faxing, and so forth are done elsewhere.

Third, electrification will reduce the amount of monies our Community spends towards Fuel and other expenses, while making repetitive trips to get perishable food items. Electrification will also reduce the likelihood, of failing grades due to poor lighting.

### Goals, components and design, Labor, contract costs, and related activities

- As of proposal date, Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter has completed assessment forms throughout the Community. And through the assessment it has been determined that 22 homes at this present time are without electricity in their homes.
- Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter officials and staff and representatives from Navajo Tribal
  Utility Authority will meet and share the required information such as the National
  Electrical Code Standards and Compliances and the need for an independent
  electrician to complete the house wiring and the contract will be administered by
  CBDG in the first phase if CBDG awards the funds.

### IV. Scope of Work

### Roles of the Principal Consultants, Developers, Researchers, and other Key Personnel that may be involved in the Project.

- Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter Officials/Administrative Staff will coordinate with all applicable entities and monitor the project. The coordination will include the initial planning, review, monitoring, and keeping homeowners informed.
- Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter will request NTUA to complete the Right of Way and all other necessary Federal required clearances. And NTUA will provide Entrance Inspection and project construction.
- Upon completion of NTUA clearances, Ts'ah Bii Kin will seek funds from CDBG. As with previous projects pertaining to house wiring and electrification, if awarded CBDG requires a significant role in the process, therefore with regard to independent electricians the CBDG administration will most likely contract qualified electricians using the Proposal request that was in compliance with the Navajo Nation Procurement Policy and Procedures. The CBDG administration will have oversight financial responsibility in reference to house wiring project, including contract and SAS process.
- CIO/Window Rock will coordinate applicable inspections with NTUA and Ts'ah
   Bii Kin regarding the installation of power lines.
- Homeowners will coordinate closely with the Chapter Planner on the overall progress of the project from the planning and other related matters as they arise.

### project from planning to construction and closeout activities

- Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter Administration employs a Planner Aide who coordinates and monitors the project progress.
- Completion of the planning of the project has been completed with the Chapter officials and Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter Administrative staff, which includes the Community Needs Assessment, NTUA for cost estimate and Resolution and Proposal for Construction Funds.
- Upon approval of Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter Resolution, Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter will pay the required funds to Navajo Tribal Utility for the Ts'ah Bii Kin Chapter House Wiring and Electrification Initiative Acquisition of Easement for Right of Way. NTUA will ensure that all National Code Standards and Compliance for Service of Entrance Inspection are complied with.
- When funds become available from Capital Improvement Office for construction, these funds will be assigned to NTUA to construct the proposed power line project.
- The closeout phase of the project will be coordinated between the Chapter,
   NTUA, CIO/Division of Community Development/Window Rock and Office of Management and Budget of Window Rock for all fund resources.
