I am pleased to sign into law this resolution CJY-64-23 approving the Fiscal Recovery Funds Delegate Regional Project Plan for Honorable Slater's Delegate Region in the amount of \$5,200,386.

My Administration supports the plans of these Chapters who have worked very hard to put together their Regional Plans and is working very closely with the Fiscal Recovery Fund Office to ensure that these funds are put to use. As such, when Chapters are running into roadblocks in expending their Fiscal Recovery Funds and the roadblock is coming from the Executive Branch, I encourage them to reach out to the Office of the President and Vice President and inform my office of the roadblock and we will work to overcome those roadblocks.

I do want to take the moment to express my concern that any amendments to the Regional Plans must be approved by the Council. In addition, the prior Navajo Nation Council has set the expectation that Fiscal Recovery Funds be encumbered by June 30, 2024. This deadline is not far off. As a construction expert, I know that there are unpredictable factors that can prevent even the best of plans from moving forward on the proposed timeline. We should be designing systems that are flexible, accountable, and transparent. We do not currently have that system and I look forward to working with you and the entire Council to improve the Navajo Nation systems, so we are supporting our communities to take advantage of this historic funding.

Now let's get to work!

### RESOLUTION OF THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL 25<sup>th</sup> NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL - FIRST YEAR, 2023

#### AN ACTION

RELATING TO THE NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE AND NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; APPROVING THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND DELEGATE REGION PROJECT PLAN FOR HONORABLE CARL R. SLATER'S DELEGATE REGION (CHAPTERS: TSAILE/WHEATFIELDS, LUKACHUKAI, ROUND ROCK, TSÉ CH'ÍZHÍ, ROCK POINT)

#### BE IT ENACTED:

#### SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. The Navajo Nation Council is the governing body of the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. § 102(A).
- B. The Naabik'íyáti' Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council with the delegated responsibility to hear proposed resolution(s) that require final action by the Navajo Nation Council. 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(9).
- C. Navajo Nation Council Resolution No. CJN-29-22, incorporated herein by reference, mandates that Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund ("NNFRF") Delegate Region Project Plans be approved by Navajo Nation Council resolution and signed into law by the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).

#### SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- Navajo Nation Council Resolution No. CJN-29-22, AN ACTION RELATING TO THE NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE AND NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; ALLOCATING \$1,070,298,867 OF NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS; APPROVING THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND EXPENDITURE PLANS FOR: CHAPTER AND REGIONAL PROJECTS; PUBLIC SAFETY EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS, E911, AND RURAL ADDRESSING PROJECTS; CYBER SECURITY; PUBLIC HEALTH PROJECTS; HARDSHIP ASSISTANCE; WATER AND WASTEWATER PROJECTS; BROADBAND PROJECTS; HOME ELECTRICITY CONNECTION AND ELECTRIC CAPACITY HOUSING PROJECTS AND MANUFACTURED PROJECTS: PROJECTS; FACILITIES: BATHROOM ADDITION CONSTRUCTION CONTINGENCY FUNDING; AND REDUCED ADMINISTRATIVE FUNDING, was signed into law by the President of the Navajo Nation on July 15, 2022.
- B. CJN-29-22, Section Three, states, in part and among other things, that

- 1. The Navajo Nation hereby approves total funding for the NNFRF Chapter and Chapter Projects Expenditure Plan from the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund in the total amount of two hundred eleven million two hundred fifty-six thousand one hundred forty-eight dollars (\$211,256,148) to be divided equally between the twenty-four (24) Delegate Regions in the amount of eight million eight hundred two thousand three hundred forty dollars (\$8,802,340) per Delegate Region . . . and allocated through Delegate Region Project Plans approved by Navajo Nation Council resolution and signed into law by the President of the Navajo Nation . . . . See CJN-29-22, Section Three (B).
- 2. The Delegate Region Project Plan funding will be allocated to the Navajo Nation Central Government, specifically the Division of Community Development or other appropriate Navajo Nation Division or Department, to implement the projects rather than directly to the Chapters. See CJN-29-22, Section Three (D).
- 3. The Navajo Nation Central Government, specifically the Division of Community Development or other appropriate Navajo Nation Division or Department, shall manage and administer funds and Delegate Region Project Plans on behalf of Non-LGA-Certified Chapters. The Navajo Nation Central Government may award funding to LGA-Certified Chapters through sub-recipient agreements to implement and manage specific projects, but shall maintain Administrative Oversight over such funding and Delegate Region Project Plans. See CJN-29-22, Section Three (E).
- 4. Each Navajo Nation Council delegate shall select Fiscal Recovery Fund eligible projects within their Delegate Region to be funded by the NNFRF Chapter and Regional Projects Expenditure Plan through a Delegate Region Projects Plan. The total cost of projects selected by each Delegate shall not exceed their Delegate Region distribution of eight million eight hundred two thousand three hundred forty dollars (\$8,802,340). See CJN-29-22, Section Three (F).
- 5. Each Delegate Region Project shall identify its Administrative Oversight entity and its Oversight Committee(s) and be subject CJY-41-21's NNDOJ initial eligibility determination. See CJN-29-22, Section Three (L)(5) and (L)(6).
- C. All projects listed in the Hon. Carl R. Slater's Delegate Region Projects Plan, attached as **Exhibit A**, have been deemed Fiscal Recovery Fund eligible by NNDOJ. In addition, Hon. Carl

- R. Slater's Delegate Region Projects Plan does *not* exceed the amount of \$8,802,340, as set forth in CJN-29-22, Section Three (F).
- D. The Navajo Nation Council hereby finds that it is in the best interest of the Navajo Nation and the Hon. Carl R. Slater's Delegate Region Chapters and communities to approve and adopt the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund Delegate Region Project Plan for Hon. Carl R. Slater's Delegate Region (Chapters: Tsaile/Wheatfields, Lukachukai, Round Rock, Tsé Ch'ízhí, Rock Point) as set forth in Exhibit A.

#### SECTION THREE. APPROVAL OF HON. CARL R. SLATER'S DELEGATE REGION PROJECT PLAN

- A. The Navajo Nation hereby approves the Fiscal Recovery Fund Delegate Region Project Plan for Hon. Carl R. Slater's Delegate Region (Chapters: Tsaile/Wheatfields, Lukachukai, Round Rock, Tsé Ch'ízhí, Rock Point) set forth in Exhibit A.
- B. The Delegate Region Project Plan approved herein shall comply with all applicable provisions of CJY-41-21, CJN-29-22, and BFS-31-21.
- C. Any inconsistencies between this legislation, the Delegate Region Project Plan, and the individual project appendix, shall be resolved in favor of the project appendix reviewed by Department of Justice during their eligibility determination(s).

#### SECTION FOUR. AMENDMENTS

Amendments to this legislation or to the Delegate Region Project Plan approved herein shall only be adopted by resolution of the Navajo Nation Council and approval of the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10),(11), and (12).

#### SECTION FIVE. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This legislation shall be effective upon its approval pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 221(B), 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(17), and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).

#### SECTION SIX. SAVING CLAUSE

If any provision of this legislation is determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, or by a Navajo Nation District Court without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, those provisions

of this legislation not determined invalid shall remain the law of the Navajo Nation.

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





#### **Wastewater Lagoon Assessment**

#### Round Rock Chapter Wastewater Lagoon.

The Round Rock Chapter is located about a quarter of a mile east from the highway 191 and N12 Intersection. The chapter is situated in Central Agency and on the Navajo Nation at an elevation of 5395. The chapter would like to upgrade their wastewater treatment lagoon. The chapter resolution ROUN2104-03 includes cleaning up the lagoon, assessing for expansion and a cost estimate for the upgrade. The lagoon is located on the north side of the Chapter and Senior Center buildings. The lagoon site (fenced area) is approximately 1 acre. The lagoon was probably built in the 1960s to mid-1970s.

The Round Rock Chapter consists of several buildings, the Chapter House, Senior Center, Headstart, Wellness Center, and three other buildings that do not appear to be opened to the public or being used. The headstart building is closed and the Wellness Center appears to be not utilized. The reasons they are closed might be because of the virus pandemic. Future development include a convenience store and a laundromat.

The purpose of this report is to evaluate the existing conditions of the lagoon site and to outline the concerns and issues and any improvements recommended for the lagoon. This assessment does not include any geotechnical site evaluations but just a visual assessment of the site. The site was visited on July 14, 2021 and September 23, 2021.

#### **Existing Infrastructure Assessment.**

The existing site is developed with buildings, paved parking area and utility infrastructure which include electricity (provided by NTUA), water (NTUA), and wastewater collection lines and a treatment lagoon (Chapter operated).

The existing one-cell wastewater lagoon is in fair to poor condition. The cell was dry. There was only a small wet spot (about 30 feet square) at the sewer line discharge point. The water could be quickly evaporating and infiltrating into the soil. Inspection at the outfall (Fig. 1) showed the wastewater flows were small and intermittent. The existing cell bottom is approximately 185 feet long, 50 feet

wide and was about 6 feet deep.

The hydrologic soil group of the soil in the cell is not known. The hydrologic soil group is determined by a USDA soil assessment if the soil is well-drained or not. There is no evidence of recent water ponding in the cell. Therefore, it may be expected that the soil has a moderate to high infiltration rate. There is no evidence of the cell being lined with clay or HDPE liner to keep the wastewater from infiltrating into the soil. If the cell was lined, there might have been some standing water in the cell. The soil at the site had mostly sand and some silt, clay and pebbles. The soil may be the SM type per USDA classification system.

Geotechnical Soil Evaluation.

A geotechnical evaluation was not conducted. This would have included soil borings to estimate soil infiltration rates, compaction, water contents and soil identification in the soil profile. An outside consultant would provide this service such as Western Technologies or Terracon Materials Testing. A geotechnical engineering firm is recommended to be retained prior to designing the upgraded lagoon treatment system to evaluate the site and soil conditions with field and laboratory testing and results. The soil evaluation will determine if the site soils are suitable for construction and the type of workmanship that is required to use the soil in constructing the cells. They would evaluate the

soils and provide a report.

#### Site Wastewater Loadings.

The wastewater loadings from the buildings were evaluated in this report. The existing lagoon is fed from an 8" sewer line that collects wastewater from the chapter compound. A manhole was found near the chapter house, near headstart and another near the senior center building. The sewer line from the chapter house appears to go under the senior center building. The manholes appear to be in good condition as seen on the surface. The sewer line may have to be scanned with a mobile camera to see the pipe

condition and to see where the connections are located. This will determine which building is connected to the sewer line.

The estimated average wastewater loads from the existing chapter buildings is 1,785 gallons per day (gpd). This estimate included flows from all of the buildings. With the future development of a C-Store and Laundromat, the wastewater load was estimated at 6,515 gpd. Wastewater loads from the full-build was estimated at 8,300 gpd and was used as the design flow in this assessment.

#### Site Evaporation.

Evaporation from Open Water Surfaces in Arizona show evaporation at Many Farms School to be about 90.77 inches per year. From figure 10, Evaporation Adjustment Factors for Arizona, for the Round Rock site is 0.72. With the adjusted evaporation, the evaporation at the site was estimated at 65 inches per year and was used in this report. For comparison, evaporation at Jeddito, AZ was 62 inches per year.

#### Site Precipitation.

The precipitation at Jeddito, AZ is 11.3 inches per year. For Round Rock, AZ, 11 inches was used.

#### Soil Seepage/Infiltration.

The soil seepage rate will be determined by the geotechnical firm's soils assessment. For Jeddito, AZ, it was determined to be 1.0x10<sup>-8</sup> m/sec with SM type soils. At Dilkon lagoon, it was 1.1x10<sup>-5</sup> m/sec with SM type soils. For Round Rock lagoon, it was estimated roughly at 7.0x10<sup>-5</sup> cm/sec or 50 inches per year. This rate is conservative.

Recommendation: The vegetation inside the existing and new cells will need to be grubbed and removed. The cell bottom and side slopes will need to be reshaped and sloped at 3:1 slope. The cell will be expanded to the south which has plenty of room. The two treatment cells will need to be lined with HDPE liner. The disposal cell will be sized based on soil infiltration rates. The sizing of the cells will be determined by the estimated wastewater loads from the existing buildings and future developments.

The treatment and disposal lagoon system will be designed in accordance with the Navajo Area Indian Health Service Design Criteria (April 2000). The facilities will function as a total retention lagoon system consisting of 2 treatment cells and one disposal cell. The 2 treatment cells will stabilize the organic load while the third cell will receive treated (effluent) overflow from the two treatment cells and will dispose of the effluent through evaporation and seepage processes. The treatment cell floors will have dimensions of 100 feet long, 65 feet wide and 5.5 feet deep. They will be lined with a HDPE liner to prevent any seepage of raw wastewater. The disposal cell floor will be 200 feet long, 50 feet wide and 3 feet deep and will be lined with local soils. The soils will be compacted to 95% of maximum

density. All three cells will have 3:1 slopes and have a 3-foot freeboard. The treatment cells should have enough capacity to treat the BOD levels. One treatment cell should be used until there is enough consistent flow (as the buildings open back up) to open the second cell. The treatment cell should never go dry which could lead to problems. The disposal cell on the other hand will be dry for more than 4 months of the year to meet requirements.

#### **Erosion and Drainage.**

The existing ground gently slopes down from Figure 3. Vegetation in Lagoon Cell the south to the north. Storm flow from the chapter compound area will flow to the north into the lagoon site. Other outside flows should not impact the lagoon site.

The site is composed of mostly sand with some fragments of rocks. There is a lot of vegetable growth (Fig. 3) inside the cell. The vegetation ranges from grass, salt bush, shrubs and to olive trees.

Recommendation: The vegetation inside the cell will need to be grubbed and removed.

The lagoon perimeter is fenced with a 6-foot high chainlink fence. The fence is in good to Figure 4. Lagoon Access Road and Fence Gate

condition. The site has access from the south side with a dirt access road and a double fence gate at the lagoon entrance.

Erosion was not present at the site during the first visit. Only small rill erosion were seen on the south slope of the cell. During the second visit there was erosion along the access road (Fig. 4) and into the cell. So, there appears to be some overland sheet flow and localized flow along the road going into the lagoon. The flow mostly comes from the parking lot and within the chapter compound.


Recommendation: Install a diversion channel with berm upstream from the fence on the south side to convey flow away from the lagoon.

#### Cost Estimate.

The cost estimate to upgrade the Round Rock Chapter Wastewater Lagoon is provided below. This estimate may be used only for budgeting purposes. The actual cost will be determined when the contractor and engineer submits their bids for the design and construction of the project. The design data and design itself may change from this preliminary design and the cost will be different.



- The Chapter has set aside reasonable amount of cost-sharing and partnership on this project; AND
- 16. This project has been planned in the local Chapter budget for years, we need to be proactive to see the end product.

# RESOLUTION OF THE COMMUNITY LAND USE PLANNING COMMITTEE OF THE ROUND ROCK CHAPTER RESOLUTION NO.: RR2208-01

ROUND ROCK COMMUNITY LAND USE PLANNING COMMITTEE SUPPORTS ROUND ROCK CHAPTER GOVERNMENT RESOLUTIONS TO 1) CONSOLIDATE TWO PARCELS OF PREVIOUSLY WITHDRAWN LANDS AND REPURPOSE FOR ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS; 2) UPGRADE WATER LINES TO BUILDINGS WITHIN CHAPTER COMPOUND; 3) WITHDRAW 10 ACRES OF LAND FOR ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PURPOSES, AND 4) REQUEST WATER RESOURCES TO EVALUATE ROUND ROCK DAM AND IRRIGATION.

#### WHEREAS:

- 1. The Round Rock Community Land Use Planning Committee (CLUPC) was established by the Round Rock Chapter Government pursuant to 26 N.N.C. Sec. 2004, Subchapter 7 for the purposes among others of creating a community land use plan that incorporates community needs, goals and priorities, serving as a Chapter advisory committee to develop, recommend, evaluate and oversee said plan, and communicating with residents how community land use planning development projects may benefit the community; and
- 2. On August 19, 2022 at a duly called Round Rock Chapter meeting, a quorum being present, Resolution ROUN2208-03 passed by a vote of 22 in favor, none opposed and five abstained to approve three acres of land withdrawn for a police Sub-station to be combined with the two acres of land withdrawn for a business site lease (Leo Jim site) for a new five acre site for the purpose of economic development, including but not limited to a shopping center, gas station, C-store, house manufacturing facility, and other concepts as supported by the Chapter; and
- 3. On August 19, 2022 at a duly called Round Rock Chapter meeting, a quorum being present, Resolution ROUN2208-04 passed by a vote of 22 in favor, none opposed and five abstained to approve a request that the Navajo Tribal Utility Authority upgrade the main water line up to two meters and for four facilities and other proposed developments, and
- 4. On August 19, 2022 at a duly called Round Rock Chapter meeting, a quorum being present, Resolution ROUN2208-08 passed by a vote of 22 in favor, none opposed and five abstained to approve withdrawal of ten acres of land for the purpose of economic development, including but not limited to a shopping center, gas station, C-store, house manufacturing facility, and other concepts as supported by the Chapter; and
- 5. On August 19, 2022 at a duly called Round Rock Chapter meeting, a quorum being present, Resolution ROUN2208-11 passed by a vote of 22 in favor, none opposed and five abstained to request Water Resources to evaluate the Round Rock irrigation intake to the reservoir, evaluate all equipment, clean out dam and purchase parts; and
- On August 24, 2022 at a duly called Round Rock Chapter CLUPC meeting, a quorum being present, CLUPC members passed a motion by a vote of three in favor, none opposed and one abstention in support of four Round Rock Chapter Government resolutions, ROUN2208-03, ROUN2208-04, ROUN2208-08 and ROUN2208-11; and





#### NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:


