By Resolution no. CJY-41-21, the Navajo Nation Council established the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund (NNFRF) and the Expenditure Authorization Process for ARPA funding. On August 2, 2021 is was signed into law by President Nez and Vice-President Lizer. Section Seven of the resolution includes an immediate allocation of Navajo Nation Council Fiscal Recovery Funds to fund central support and regulatory programs.

The Navajo Nation Office of Legislative Counsel submitted the project description from the NNFRF Administrative Support Costs. The Department of Justice has reviewed the form and determined the project eligible. The following is a summary of their determination:

The Navajo Nation Code contains the general and permanent laws that have been enacted by the Navajo Nation Council and its Standing Committees since the formation of the Navajo Nation government. Presently, the Navajo Nation Code requires a major update that needs to include: 1) revisions to previously published law, and 2) additions of new law, before an updated publication can be made by the OLC. The major issue, that impedes the current published form of the Navajo Nation Code, is that Navajo Nation law and emergency management are inherently intertwined as the Navajo Nation Code provides the authorities and funding for any kind of emergency management; thus, leaving the Navajo Nation at a disadvantage (hence the need for an update) when emergencies (i.e. COVID-19 pandemic or any future unforeseen nationwide emergency) arise as the Navajo Nation Code is always an integral part of helping to develop the response of the Navajo Nation to such types of emergency situations. ✓ document attached

Code (Titles I thru 26) pursuant to 2 N.N.C. \$ 964(B)

This memorandum serves as a written narrative to justify the need to fund the update to and publication of the Navajo Nation Code (Titles I thru 20) pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 964(B).

General Knowledge about the Application of Laws to the Navajo Nation. The Navajo Nation extends into the states of Arizona, New Mexico and Utah, with land interests in the state of Colorado. This massive span of territory makes the Navajo Nation subject to not only its own laws but also to the laws of the relevant state and relevant laws of the federal government who serve as trustee for the Navajo Nation in many of its vast holdings, specifically its trust responsibility to the Navajo people and their resources. Thereby, the application of laws is extremely important to the Navajo Nation as many complex matters related to the Navajo Nation's interests are at constant issue (and often challenged) at all levels of government (tribal, state, federal) for the Navajo Nation.

General Background of the Navajo Nation Code, From time immemorial, the Navajo people have governed themselves through evolving concepts of Naubik'iyaii' that were sowed by the seeds of aboriginal thought processes carefully crafted through sacred prayers and songs that guided the application of natural law to preserve the Navajo people and its way of life. Then in 1923, the Navajo people installed it's first (I4) Navajo Council who became the governing body of the Navajo people and laid the foundation of the Navajo Nation Code. And, since that time, the Navajo Nation Code, through the Navajo people's exercise of its inherent right to self-governance and self-determination, has evolved to govern the Navajo people and its many

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interests. Then in 1998, the Navajo Nation Council established the Office of Legislative Counsel who, by statute, are charged to serve as the legal counsel to the Navajo Nation Council, Standing Committees. Boards, Commissions, and the Legislative Branch. And, part of that charge, pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 964(B), provides that the Office of Legislative Counsel is responsible for the codification of Navajo Nation laws, rules and regulations, which are organized under the Navajo Nation Code (Titles I thru 26), which contains the general and permanent laws that have been enacted by the Navajo Nation Council and its Standing Committees since the formation of the Navajo Nation government.

Overdue Need to Update and Publish the Navajo Nation Code to Protect and Preserve the Navajo People. Presently, the published form of the Navajo Nation Code requires a major update that needs to include: I) revisions to previously published law, and 2) additions of new law, before an updated publication can be made by the Office of Eegislative Counsel. The major issue that impedes the current published form of the Navajo Nation Code, is that Navajo Nation law and emergency management are inherently intertwined as the Navajo Nation Code provides the authorities and funding parameters for any kind of emergency management; thus, leaving the Navajo Nation at a disadvantage (due to the need for an update) when emergencies (i.e. COVID 19 pandemic or any future unforeseen Navajo Nation wide emergency) arise as the Navajo Nation Code is always an integral part of helping to develop the response of the Navajo Nation to such types of emergency situations.

Long-Term Benefit of Updating the Navajo Nation Code (Project). The appropriation of F.R.F. Funds to this vital Project will serve to greatly benefit the Navajo Nation government, its communities and its people as it will provide a vessel to update the Navajo Nation Code that serves as the "Law of the Land" for the Navajo Nation. Specifically, the Project will provide the Navajo Nation with a necessary life saving and quality of life advantage if another world wide (i.e. COVID 19 pandemic, major natural disaster, etc.) or nationwide emergency affects the health and safety of the Navajo people. As history has dictated in recent years, the Navajo Nation's immediate response is to use its codified laws, which provides authorities and funding parameters, to develop an immediate emergency response that mitigates the loss of health, property, livelihood and life of the Navajo people; therefore, deeming this Project of the utmost priority for the Navajo Nation.

Conclusion in Support of Need. Accordingly, based on the foregoing grounds, this request for funds should be deemed as an FRF Higible project as it serves to provide for the long term benefit to the Navajo Nation, its government and the Navajo people, especially during world wide or nationwide emergencies. Further, the Navajo Nation needs to prepare for future unforescencircumstances as the Navajo Nation Code is always integral in helping to develop the response of the Navajo Nation to such types of emergency situations. Our office appreciates your favorable consideration of this justification, and further, approving our request for F.R.F. Funds. CJY-41-21 SECTION SEVEN

The Navajo Nation hereby immediately allocates NNFRF funds to replace the Navajo Nation CARES Fund funds that were reallocated to the Navajo Nation Hardship Assistance Expenditure Plan pursuant to Navajo Nation Council Resolution No. CJY-67-20 and Naabik'íyáti' Committee Resolutions No. NABIO-49-20 and NABID-63-20, as well as any CARES Fund funding that was voluntarily returned to the Nation because the project approved by the Navajo Nation Council could not be completed by the federal CARES Act deadline(s). OMB, with the assistance of OCC, shall report the amount and status of such allocations to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee and the Office of President and Vice-President no later than sixty (60) days after the effective date of this legislation.

SECTION SEVEN. IMMEDIATE ALLOCATION OF NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS TO FUND CENTRAL SUPPORT AND REGULATORY SERVICES

- A. The Navajo Nation hereby immediately allocates ten percent (10%) of all Fiscal Recovery Funds received by the Navajo Nation to fund central support service and regulatory costs.
- B. The Office of the President and Vice-President shall be responsible for apportioning ninety percent (90%) of the ten percent (10%) amount amongst Executive Branch programs and offices providing central support and regulatory services, including, the Office of the President and Vice-President, Office of the Controller, Office of Management and Budget, Department of Justice, Navajo Nation Washington Office, Division of Human Resources, Division of Community Development, and other Divisions and offices providing central support and/or regulatory services.
- C. The Speaker of the Navajo Nation Council, after consultation with the Naabik'íyáti' Committee, shall be responsible for apportioning ten percent (10%) of the ten percent (10%) amount amongst Legislative Branch programs and offices providing central support services, including the Office of Legislative Services, Office of Legislative Counsel, Office of the Speaker, and Navajo Nation Council.
- D. The programs and offices receiving NNFRF for central support and/or regulatory services shall use such funding to develop the legal, financial, organizational, managerial, administrative, regulatory, and reporting framework necessary to support the expeditious completion of NNFRF funded projects and the provision of NNFRF funded services.
- E. The detailed budgets for the NNFRF funding allocated here for central support and regulatory services shall be processed through the executive or administrative review process
