The Day At A Time Club, Inc. (DAATC) is very appreciative of your Chapter's support for ARPA Funding for the Fort Defiance and Chinle Recovery Centers for a two (2) year period. The proposal is for \$779,736.00 that was proposed and submitted on May 27, 2021 to address issues related to the COVID-19 Pandemic. We are all aware that the Inflation and Consumer Price AIndex has reached alarming high levels and we would ask for a consideration to reflect a 15% inflationary Cost, if possible. During the meeting, President Nez had requested that Navajo Nation Department of Health to assist DAATC in this matter, hence this request.

## RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS DAY AT A TIME CLUB, INC

Approving the submission of a Proposal and a Budget in the amount of \$463,868 and \$315,686 to the Office of the President and Vice President and the Navajo Nation Council for the Chinle/Fort Defiance Recovery Centers to assist in the prevention of alcohol and substance abuse.

#### WHEREAS:

- Day at a Time Club, Inc., (DAATC) has been incorporated under the State of Arizona on May 03, 1983;
   and
- 2. DAATC provides a fellowship setting where members can engage in mutual support with others who are also struggling with alcohol/chemical addiction; and
- 3. DAATC has integrated cultural and spiritual traditions to inspire and motivate members and their families to participate in the purification ceremonies to promote healing and awareness of self and the higher power using sweat lodge, talking circle, etc. to talk about inner struggles and difficulties; and
- 4. DAATC has solicited and brought in resources to connect members and their families by setting-up presentations/workshops to strengthen their skills/talents so they can become responsible (suicide prevention training, parenting classes, and domestic violence sessions); and
- DAATC has referred, sponsored, supported, and encouraged chemically dependent individuals and their families to programs such as domestic violence prevention/interventions centers and to help in their pursuit to recovery; and
- 6. DAATC has provided community outreach to help members and their families to attend special events (Annual Sobriety/Family Wellness Campout. Thanksgiving and Christmas Dinners, Wellness Run, Easter Egg Hunt, Christmas Gift Giving for Children), and
- 7. DAATC has reached-out in other areas to inmates to attend Alcoholic Anonymous Meetings, including Traditional Sweat Lodge; and
- DAATC has provided daily services to members in Fort Defiance, Window Rock, and surrounding communities within a 100-mile radius covering Black Mesa, Pinon, Dilcon, Round Rock. Lukachukai. Wide Ruins, Klagetoh, Lupton, Sheepsprings, and Gallup, etc.; and
- DAATC, Chinle Chapter and the Chinle Canyon De Chelly Group are partnering to develop and establish the Chinle Recovery Center to address the all too prevalent problem of Alcohol and Substance Abuse and related issues in Chinle Chapter and surrounding Chapters; and
- 10. DAATC is now submitting a funding proposal in the amount of \$463,868 and \$315,868 for the Chinle/Fort Defiance Recovery Centers to accommodate the increase of participation and to continue providing services to member/nonmembers and their families to participate in sponsored meetings, family events, and outside resources to reinforce their sobriety and regenerate relationships.

## NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. The Day at a Time Club, Inc. approves and respectfully submits the funding proposal and a budget in the amount of \$463,868 and \$315,868 for the Chinle/Fort Defiance Recovery Centers to the Office of the President and Vice President and the Navajo Nation Council to prevent alcohol and substance abuse and to increase self-efficiency for members and their families.

2. The Day at a Time Club, Inc. will also seek to address and obtain Employee Insurance Coverage for its

Recovery Center.

### Grant Proposal Submitted to the Chinle Chapter and Navajo Nation for ARP Funding

- A. Title: Chinle/Ft. Defiance Alcohol and Substance Abuse Recovery Centers
- B. Organization: The Day At A Time Club (DAATC), Inc. located in Fort Defiance, Arizona is incorporated in the State of Arizona, established in 1978, with "The mission to promote healing and wellness to residents of the Navajo Nation by providing high quality substance abuse and recovery services while integrating cultural and spiritual traditions as tool to remedy the all too prevalent problem of alcohol and substance abuse among our Navajo People." The DAATC is also incorporated as a Non-Profit Organization and has Tax-Exempt Status Under U.S. Federal Guidelines. DAATC's Vision Statement is to "Break the Cycle of Substance Abuse by providing a supportive, holistic and healing environment that is culturally relevant to residents of the Navajo Nation. Develop connections with our Proud Native American Heritage and Strengthen and Empower a personal recovery process to restore Hózhó, including physical, mental, emotional and spiritual valves."

C. Purpose:

The purpose of this grant proposal is to initially re-establish a Recovery Center in the Chinle Chapter formally known as the Talbot House. The Talbot House was destroyed by a fire and is no longer in existence. The Apache County donated a double-wide to the Chinle/Canyon De Chelly AA Group several years ago and is now needing major renovation, repair and maintenance. The DAATC will be co-sponsoring the re-establishment of the Chinle Recovery Center through Project and Program Development cost sharing through funding resources, Staffing, Operations and Maintenance of the facility until such time the Chinle Recovery Center can become Self-Sustaining.

#### D. Needs Statement:

There is a tremendous need for a Alcohol and Substance Abuse Recovery and Wellness Center for the Chinle Community and Chinle Agency Communities. Since the fire destruction of the Talbot House, there is a strong need for Twelve Step Recovery Programs/Services such as AA, Alanon, Narcotics Anonymous and other related programs. Many of the Chinle and area residents travel over One Hundred Fifty-Two Hundred Miles round trip to Fort Defiance, Showlow, Flagstaff or Gallup, NM. Prior to the COVID-Pandemic, AA Meetings were held at various church locations five (5) days a week with a average attendance of 100+ persons daily.

### E. Scope of Services:

1. The donated building as donated by Apache County will be assessed for a cost estimate for renovation, Expansion of the facility can be accomplished by planning and construction of a 26' x 30' addition to the double wide modular building to accommodate an anticipated attendance of 100+ membership. Preliminary assessments would be approximately \$120,000 with 15% contingency cost \$18,000 totalling \$138,000. This would include meeting all building codes and specifications, handicapped assistance, fire prevention, parking, space usage, etc.

- 2. With Grant Funding DAATC staff will be assigned to coordinate and assist with the renovation and administration support services, staff training and development for the Chinle Recovery Services Center and Staff. Local residents with strong and healthy, recovery will be hire and will receive necessary support/training at the DAATC facility in Fort Defiance several times per week. This process will be performed by quarterly progression of the Chinle Recovery Center and as other local facilities may be utilized in the interim period. DAATC Facilities may also continue to be utilized. Development and Staff Training will be on Transitional phases.
- 3. The Goal of the Chinle Recovery Center will be to

-Complete the renovation of the facility.

-Re-establish the Canyon De Chelly AA/Recovery Group as a Automous Organization to

provide vital 12-step, mentoring and related services.

-Establish a separate Non-profit tax exempt Organization with a Board of Directors to maintain and operate the facility and work closely with the Canyon De Chelly Chinle/group and other recovery service providers in the area. Board of Directors will be local individuals with Board experience and expertise, i.e. Church groups, Chapter Officials/Staff, business leaders and community organizations, etc.

#### 4. Description of Services:

The task of the Chinle Recovery Center Staff, Canyon De Chelly Group (Group Conscience) DAATC and Spiritual Awakening Group will provide culturally specific peer-to-peer recovery support services to those affected by alcoholism, substance abuse. co-dependency, and domestic violence (Information & Referral) and related issues. The 12-Steps Group (Alcoholics Anonymous) will continue to be hosted. Clients will be provided with individual support services (confidential mentoring) to foster development of an alcohol/drug free lifestyle. Clients will be encouraged to develop positive communication skills, improved family relationships, parenting skills, diet and nutrition. options for adult education, career development, vocational and occupational mentoring and increased retention in their continuum of care for alcohol and drug abuse treatment. Referrals to a residential alcohol and substance abuse treatment, mental health, medical, dental and other human and health care services will be made as the need arises and occasional transportation will be provided to ensure client health care and treatment needs are met. Case conferencing and Collateral Services will support clients long-term continuous Sobriety, family harmony, and productivity within their community. Our ultimate goals are to assist our clients in achieving a productive lifestyle free of alcohol and other substance abuse. This will improve the quality of life and standard of living for them, their children, spouse or partner, extended family, and the greater community.

#### The core functions and Mission of Day At A Time Club, Inc. are to;

- Assist residents of the Navajo Nation to attain sobriety;
- Provide outpatient mentoring to recovering Alcoholics, chemically dependent persons and their families.
- Refer chemically dependent individuals and their co-dependents to treatment programs;

- Sponsor, support, and encourage the alcoholic and family members in their recovery;
- Provide information and referral services to the community regarding substance abuse;
- Job readiness support and life survival skills training.

### The core values of DAATC, Inc. are;

- Love, to tolerance and acceptance;
- Hózhó and Respect for ourselves, each other, our families, our youth, our elders, our diversity and harmony in our lives.
- Focus on strengths rather than weaknesses;
- Encouragement of Spiritual values;
- Value of life experiences, traditional and cultural;
- Promote traditional healing practices.

One of ultimate goals is to start a Navajo Language Speaking Meetings for the fluent Navajo language speakers in the program of Alcoholics Anonymous (AA). This would enable them to better understand how the program works and further encourage the interest of other individuals who may be compelled to learning or improving their Navajo language by attending AA meetings. To assist those who have difficulty understanding and reading English.

Another goal is to start a Transitional Living Center (TLC) a temporary shelter for those who are seeking recovery and have received a referral to and from an inpatient treatment facility. A strategic plan is developed to provide this service with the collaborative efforts of local support programs, community leaders and community members. DAATC will provide a safe alcohol and drug free environment that will contribute to providing a higher rate of rehabilitation from their addiction.


### F. Immediate Tasks to be performed:

- 1. Confirm that the building is donated and assigned to the Chinle/Canyon AA De Chelly Group
- 2. Develop and finalize a Memoranda of Agreement to define the Land Use within the Catholic Church for the center.
- 3. Obtain Funding for the Recovery Centers Facilities/Maintenance operations and Personnel, etc.

#### G. Statistics:

In AA Meetings, an important messages provided to members to stick with the winners. This Means that spending time those individuals, but it can also be highly motivating. Therefore, positive role models, additional resources and educational information provided at DAATC has increased self-efficacy for some of the members and their families (refer to success stories and the statistics for attendance). The attendance and participation has increased from FY 2012 (2,577) to FY 2018 (26,392), in FY 2019 it was 23,843 in FY 2020 it was 14,520 despite the Pandemic, we anticipated the attendance and participation to continue to increase because more individuals have indicated their desire to seek services at DAATC. The attendance for 2020 was decreased due to the pandemic. Multi-year funding for FY 2021 is being requested with the Navajo Nation Division of Health and Division of Social Services. Other Foundation Proposals are being submitted as well. Letters of Success from a woman and a man are also attached as Exhibit "B".

Prior to the COVID-19 Pandemic, Chinle AA Meetings were experiencing approximately 100+ individuals with a strong desire for Sobriety, including their families. DAATC strongly feels Chinle will be experiencing the same statistical demands for services.



#### H. Proposal Grant Funding Request:

#### I. Conclusion Remarks:

Multi-Year funding from American Rescue Plan (ARP) will allow a consistent delivery of Services on a long term basis for optimum effectiveness. Other Match Resource funding Can be requested from the Navajo Department of Health and Division of Social Services and the Indian Health Services. Other Funding Sources from various foundations will also be strongly pursued.

To the reader:

Is there a way back?

Start this in the usual manner, my name is Chris and I am an alcoholic. I am a male in my mid thirty's and I live on the reservation of the Navajo Nation. I lived here and grew up here in the high desert going to catholic school and around my culture. I didn't set out in my life to become another drunk Indian. I got high and drunk in my teen years. I drank with my best friend, who was my cousin. We drank to black out. I thought that how you were supposed to drink. Alcohol became an escape and brought the life I thought I wanted to live, parties in the desert, driving drunk in the middle of nowhere, with people who drank like me.

Then suddenly there was trouble, after about 9 to 10 years of hard drinking. I had lost control. A lot of alcoholism exist here on the Rez. I have lost family and friends to alcohol poisoning, car crashes, to acts of violence, to freezing on the side of the road trying to make it to the store, to buy a drink in a snow storm. And many more ways. My drinking was cheap whiskey or vodka, sleeves of shooters, pints, fifths, and tall can of high percent malt liquor. In the end it was insomnia, sweating, shaking, dry heaving, hallucinating, and irrational fear. Self-imposed thinking that cause me depression and panic attacks. I ended up in the only place that could help, the emergency room. The doctors would tell me that I am an alcoholic, "no shit", that I was going to die. Seeing the straps on the bed and nurse asking if I wanted to be restrain, I had moment of surrender. I didn't know how to get help, but knowing I'm going to die an alcoholic death. I started to realize I don't know who I am without that bottle. That in fact I have not really live a day in my life. My crazy doctor, psychiatrist, who was a fellow in the amazing program of recovery call Alcoholics Anonymous, pulled the Big Book off the shelf and pointed me to the rooms of A.A.

Sobriety! After months of still drinking and going to the rooms, (I'm laughing typing this), I understood. This was not an overnight matter for me. The home group in my town was called Spiritual Awakening Group, a white building with 3 meeting a day and good coffee. One of the first words that stuck in my mind was from a long timer, when she said, "There is a Solution to your Drinking Problem..." I tried to work the program, asking questions, and attending meetings. I got a sponsor and worked my steps and had 3 months of sobriety. I lost it again and relapse. But this time was different because all I wanted when I came to was to go to a meeting. I got the white building in the thralls of still being an intoxicated, but conscience enough to talk and listen. There was no meeting and I was about to go home when a fellow member saw me and said he would have a meeting with me. We sat on the steps of the church across the parking lot. He didn't have to do what he did, but I am sure glad he did. He ask me to come back that evening for another meeting. I don't know exactly how it happened, I surrender myself in front of everyone. The words I remember saying were, "I don't want to die..." It was embarrassing to say the less, crying and sobbing. But no one laugh or judge me, instead they gave me a few hugs and told me to keep coming back. My sponsor found me and we work the program of A.A.

Is there a way back? Absolutely YES!!! I found a place where people like me understand that Alcoholism is a deadly disease. Through rigorous self-honesty, 12 sfeps, a sponsor, a fellowship,

and the white building on the reservation I found sobriety. I have since travel to other home groups on the rez and border towns. I have heard the message, through a higher power and the program of Alcoholics Anonymous. "To stay sober and help anothers recover from alcohol." I stay sober today by chairing online meeting for Spiritual Awakening Group, being a trusted servant to other home groups, acts of kindness and service. Many others ways that only a fellow in the rooms would understand. As one of my friends likes to say, "I am glad to be a sober native, not only that, but happy, joyous, and free! There is nothing better than this."

October 20, 2019 was my last drink. Thanks to all who were and still are a part of my journey. Thank you S.A.G. and its fellowship. One day at a time.

- Chris, to my cousin, N.D. and all those who die from alcohol...

I remember walking into the Day at a Time Club on October 23, 2019 as if it was yesterday.

There I was fresh out of jail, arrested for DUI, my children put in foster care, and not knowing where else to go. I had been here a few times before, but was not quite convinced I was an alcoholic; I decided to do some 'controlled drinking'. Alas, I knew this was it: my drinking career was over; I could not do it anymore. I knew I would die if I kept drinking the way I was, but I also could not picture my life without alcohol. I did not know how to live a sober life. At the same time, I was ready to surrender. Inside the doors of the building were welcoming, smiling faces who shared their stories of hope and experience.

The first days of recovery were extremely difficult. I came to Day at a Time Club as much as possible, for it was the only place I felt safe: from myself and from the world around me. I sat, listened, did as I was told, and kept coming back. I found a sponsor who agreed to take me through the steps. I saw people who had what I wanted — sobriety and peace. They understood my story and my journey, which was so different from the isolation I had felt much of my life. With the help of my Higher Power, the rooms of Day at a Time Club, hard work, guidance, determination and willingness, I have not taken a drink since.

Now, the Day at a Time Club continues to be a safe haven for me. I am able to attend regular meetings (within CDC guidelines because of the pandemic), meet with other people in the program, and give back to the newcomer what was freely given to me. At last, I finally feel a sense of belonging. I am able to function as an appropriate adult, as a healthcare professional, as a single mother to my four children. The emotions I once used to drink over are now managed by the tools I have been taught.

Above all, I have learned how to love myself which was something I had never learned in my thirty-three years of existence. None of this would be possible without the Day at a Time Club. - D.S.
