As such, when Chapters are running into roadblocks in expending their Fiscal Recovery Funds and the roadblock is coming from the Executive Branch, I encourage them to reach out to the Office of the President and Vice-President and we will work together to overcome it. As you know, my Administration has been working to put in place quicker and more flexible Navajo Nation systems. I look forward to working with you and the entire Council to improve Navajo Nation systems so that we are supporting our communities and taking advantage of this historic funding.

I do want us to be cognizant that the prior Navajo Nation Council has set the expectation that Fiscal Recovery Funds be encumbered by June 30, 2024. This date is not far off. As a construction expert, I know that there are unpredictable factors that can prevent even the best of plans from moving forward on a proposed timeline.

Now let's get to work!

RESOLUTION OF THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL 25th NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL - FIRST YEAR, 2023

AN ACTION

RELATING TO THE NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE AND NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; AMENDING CMY-39-23 AND CAP-11-23, THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND DELEGATE REGION PROJECT PLAN FOR HONORABLE STEVEN R. ARVISO'S DELEGATE REGION (CHAPTERS: CHURCHROCK, IYANBITO, MARIANO LAKE, PINEDALE, SMITH LAKE, THOREAU), TO INCLUDE ADDITIONAL PROJECTS FOR THIS DELEGATE REGION

BE IT ENACTED:

SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. The Navajo Nation Council is the governing body of the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. § 102(A).
- B. The Naabik'íyáti' Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council with the delegated responsibility to hear proposed resolution(s) that require final action by the Navajo Nation Council. 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(9).
- C. Navajo Nation Council Resolution No. CJN-29-22, incorporated herein by reference, mandates that Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund ("NNFRF") Delegate Region Project Plans be approved by Navajo Nation Council resolution and signed into law by the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).
- D. Navajo Nation Council Resolution No. CAP-11-23, herein by reference, mandates that amendments to the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund Delegate Region Project Plan for Honorable Steven R. Arviso's Delegate Region (Chapter: Churchrock, Iyanbito, Mariano Lake, Pinedale, Smith Lake, Thoreau) be approved by a Navajo Nation Council resolution and signed into law by the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(17), and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).
- E. Navajo Nation Council Resolution No. CMY-39-23, herein by reference, mandates that amendments to the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund Delegate Region Project Plan for Honorable Steven R. Arviso's Delegate Region (Chapter: Churchrock, Iyanbito, Mariano Lake, Pinedale, Smith Lake, Thoreau) be approved by a Navajo Nation Council resolution and signed into law by the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(17), and 2 N.N.C. § 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).

SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- Navajo Nation Council Resolution No. CJN-29-22, AN ACTION RELATING TO THE NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE AND NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; ALLOCATING \$1,070,298,867 OF NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS; APPROVING THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND EXPENDITURE PLANS FOR: CHAPTER AND REGIONAL PROJECTS; PUBLIC SAFETY EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS, E911, AND ADDRESSING PROJECTS; CYBER SECURITY; PUBLIC HEALTH PROJECTS; HARDSHIP ASSISTANCE; WATER AND WASTEWATER PROJECTS; BROADBAND PROJECTS; HOME ELECTRICITY CONNECTION AND ELECTRIC CAPACITY PROJECTS: HOUSING PROJECTS AND MANUFACTURED HOUSING FACILITIES; BATHROOM ADDITION PROJECTS; CONSTRUCTION CONTINGENCY FUNDING; AND REDUCED ADMINISTRATIVE FUNDING, was signed into law by the President of the Navajo Nation on July 15, 2022.
- B. CJN-29-22, Section Three, states, in part and among other things, that
 - 1. The Navajo Nation hereby approves total funding for the NNFRF Chapter and Chapter Projects Expenditure Plan from the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund in the total amount of two hundred eleven million two hundred fifty-six thousand one hundred forty-eight dollars (\$211,256,148) to be divided equally between the twenty-four (24) Delegate Regions in the amount of eight million eight hundred two thousand three hundred forty dollars (\$8,802,340) per Delegate Region . . . and allocated through Delegate Region Project Plans approved by Navajo Nation Council resolution and signed into law by the President of the Navajo Nation See CJN-29-22, Section Three (B).
 - 2. The Delegate Region Project Plan funding will be allocated to the Navajo Nation Central Government, specifically the Division of Community Development or other appropriate Navajo Nation Division or Department, to implement the projects rather than directly to the Chapters. See CJN-29-22, Section Three (D).
 - 3. The Navajo Nation Central Government, specifically the Division of Community Development or other appropriate Navajo Nation Division or Department, shall manage and administer funds and Delegate Region Project Plans on behalf of Non-LGA-Certified Chapters. The Navajo Nation Central Government may award funding to LGA-Certified Chapters through sub-recipient agreements to implement and manage specific projects, but shall maintain Administrative Oversight over such funding and Delegate Region Project Plans. See CJN-29-22, Section Three (E).

- 4. Each Navajo Nation Council delegate shall select Fiscal Recovery Fund eligible projects within their Delegate Region to be funded by the NNFRF Chapter and Regional Projects Expenditure Plan through a Delegate Region Projects Plan. The total cost of projects selected by each Delegate shall not exceed their Delegate Region distribution of eight million eight hundred two thousand three hundred forty dollars (\$8,802,340). See CJN-29-22, Section Three (F).
- 5. Each Delegate Region Project shall identify its Administrative Oversight entity and its Oversight Committee(s) and be subject CJY-41-21's NNDOJ initial eligibility determination. See CJN-29-22, Section Three (L)(5) and (L)(6).
- C. The Navajo Nation Council Resolution No. CAP-11-23, AN ACTION RELATING TO THE NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE AND NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; APPROVING THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND DELEGATE REGION PROJECT PLAN FOR HONORABLE STEVEN R. ARVISO'S DELEGATE REGION (CHAPTERS: CHURCHROCK, IYANBITO, MARIANO LAKE, PINEDALE, SMITH LAKE, THOREAU), was signed into law by the President of the Navajo Nation on May 4, 2023.
- D. CAP-11-23, Section Four, states that:
 - 1. Amendments to this legislation or to the Delegate Region Project Plan approved herein shall only be adopted by resolution of the Navajo Nation Council and approval of the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).
- E. The Navajo Nation Council Resolution No. CMY-39-23, AN ACTION RELATING TO THE NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE AND NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; AMENDING CAP-11-23, THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND DELEGATE REGION PROJECT PLAN FOR HONORABLE STEVEN R. ARVISO'S DELEGATE REGION (CHAPTERS: CHURCHROCK, IYANBITO, MARIANO LAKE, PINEDALE, SMITH LAKE, THOREAU), TO INCLUDE ADDITIONAL PROJECTS FOR THIS DELEGATE REGION was signed into law by the President of the Navajo Nation on June 8, 2023.
- F. CMY-39-23, Section Four, states that:
 - 1. Amendments to this legislation or to the Delegate Region Project Plan approved herein shall only be adopted by resolution of the Navajo Nation Council and approval of the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005 (C) (10), (11), and (12).

- G. All additional projects listed in the Hon. Steven R. Arviso's Delegate Region Projects Plan, attached as **Exhibit A**, have been deemed Fiscal Recovery Fund eligible by NNDOJ. In addition, Hon. Steven R. Arviso's Delegate Region Projects Plan does not exceed the amount of \$8,802,340, as set forth in CJN-29-22, Section Three (F).
- H. The Navajo Nation Council hereby finds that it is in the best interest of the Navajo Nation and the Hon. Steven R. Arviso's Delegate Region Chapters and communities to approve and adopt the additional projects as part of the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund Delegate Region Project Plan for Hon. Steven R. Arviso's Delegate Region (Chapters: Churchrock, Iyanbito, Mariano Lake, Pinedale, Smith Lake, Thoreau) as set forth in Exhibit A.

SECTION THREE. AMENDING CMY-39-23 AND CAP-11-23, THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND DELEGATE REGION PROJECT PLAN FOR HONORABLE STEVEN R. ARVISO'S DELEGATE REGION (CHAPTERS: CHURCHROCK, IYANBITO, MARIANO LAKE, PINEDALE, SMITH LAKE, THOREAU), TO INCLUDE ADDITIONAL PROJECTS FOR THIS DELEGATE REGION

- A. The Navajo Nation hereby approves the additional projects as part of the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund Delegate Region Project Plan for Steven R. Arviso's Delegate Region (Chapters: Churchrock, Iyanbito, Mariano Lake, Pinedale, Smith Lake, Thoreau) set forth in Exhibit A.
- B. The Delegate Region Project Plan approved herein shall comply with all applicable provisions of CJY-41-21, CJN-29-22, and BFS-31-21.
- C. Any inconsistencies between this legislation, the Delegate Region Project Plan, and the individual project appendix, shall be resolved in favor of the project appendix reviewed by Department of Justice during their eligibility determination(s).

SECTION FOUR. AMENDMENTS

Amendments to this legislation or to the Delegate Region Project Plan approved herein shall only be adopted by resolution of the Navajo Nation Council and approval of the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).

SECTION FIVE. EFFECTIVE DATE

This legislation shall be effective upon its approval pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 221(B), 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(17), and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).

SECTION SIX. SAVING CLAUSE

If any provision of this legislation is determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, or by a Navajo Nation District Court without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, those provisions of this legislation not determined invalid shall remain the law of the Navajo Nation.

APPROVING THE AMERICAN RECOVERY PLAN ACT (ARPA) FUNDS PROPOSAL AND REQUEST FOR THE MARIANO LAKE CHAPTER PROJECTS FOR THE DELEGATE REGIONAL EXPENDITURE PLAN FUNDS IN THE AMOUNT OF ONE MILLION FOUR HUNDRED SIXTY SEVEN THOUSAND FIFTY SIX DOLLARS AND SIXTY SEVEN CENTS (\$1,467,056.67) FOR THE FOLLOWING PROJECTS: HOME IMPROVEMENTS, PROFESSIONAL SERVICES, EMERGENCY SERVICES COORDINATOR AND PREMIUM PAY.

WHEREAS:

- 1. Pursuant to 26 N.N.C., Section 1 (B.1) the Mariano Lake Chapter is a duly recognized certified chapter of the Navajo Nation Government, as listed at 11 N.N.C., part 1, section 10; and
- 2. Pursuant to 26 N.N.C., Section 1 (B.1) the purpose of the Local Governance Act is to recognize governance at the local level. Through the Navajo Nation Council Delegates to Chapters governmental authority with respect to local matters consistent with Navajo law, including custom and tradition; and
- 3. Pursuant to 26 N.N.C., Section 1 (B.2) enactment of the Local Governance Act allows Chapters to make decisions over local matters. This authority, in the long run, will improve community decision making, allow communities to excel and flourish, enable Navajo leaders to lead towards a prosperous future, and improve the strength and sovereignty of the Navalo Nation. Through adoption of this Act, Chapters are compelled to govern with responsibility and accountability to the local citizens; and
- 4. Pursuant to 26 N.N.C., Section 103 (A) the members of each Chapter, at a duly called meeting, are authorized to oversee the authority delegated to the Chapter;
- 5. The Mariano Lake Chapter, as part of Honorable Edmund Yazzie Region was allocated funds from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Delegate Regional Expenditure Plan to provide services to the Community of Mariano Lake Chapter; and
- 6. The Mariano Lake Chapter Officials, Land Use Planning Committee Members and Volunteers participated in the in-service training provided by the Chapter Administration to ensure the understanding that this is a one-time assistance to community members to overcome the negative of the Coronavirus; and
- 7. The Mariano Lake Chapter has identified the projects to be funded by the American Recovery Plan Act Funds through the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds Office accordingly: A) Plan & Construct Home Improvements, and obtain B) Technical & Logistics Assistance by contracting Professional Services to Plan, Design & provide Project Management Services, and obtain C) Emergency Services Coordinator for temporary full time employment, and obtain D) Premium Payment for the Mariano Lake Chapter Community Services Coordinator and Accounts Maintenance Specialist to mitigate the negative effects of the Coronavirus; and
- 8. The Mariano Lake Chapter has discussed and concluded the projects to be in the best interest of assisting the community to improve the safety and health of the residents, and the projects will ensure improvements and completion of all eligible programs and projects provided by the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds Office using the American Recovery Plan (ARPA) Act Funds.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 002-20

EXTENDING THE DECLARATION OF A STATE OF EMERGENCY DUE TO THE COVID-19 VIRUS ON THE NAVAJO NATION, EXTENDING THE CLOSURE OF NAVAJO NATION GOVERNMENT OFFICES AND RELATED ENTITIES

NAVAJO NATION OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT AND VICE PRESIDENT MARCH 31, 2020

WHEREAS:

- 1. The President of the Navajo Nation serves as the Chief Executive Officer for the Executive Branch of the Navajo Nation government with full authority to conduct, supervise, and coordinate personnel and program matters. 2.N.N.C. §1005 (A);
- 2. The President shall have the power to issue an executive order for the purpose of interpreting, implementing or giving administrative effect to statutes of the Navajo Nation in the manner set forth in such statutes. 2.N.N.C. §1005 (C)(14);
- 3. With the concurrence of the President of the Navajo Nation, the Emergency Management Commission shall have the power to declare a state of emergency affecting the Navajo Nation and to obtain, coordinate and oversee assistance, whether in the form of goods, services, equipment, motor vehicles, or personnel, from all Divisions, Departments and Enterprises of the Navajo Nation for use in addressing the requirements of the People in any declared emergency. 2 N.N.C. § 884(B)(1)(3);
- 4. The Emergency Management Commission declared an emergency due to the confirmation of the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) in regional areas surrounding the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. § 884(B)(1), See Emergency Management Commission resolution CEM 20-03-11;
- 5. An Executive Order shall have the force of law upon the recipient. 2 N.N.C. § 1005(C)(14).

THEREFORE:

I, Jonathan Nez, President of the Navajo Nation and I, Myron Lizer, Vice President of the Navajo Nation, by the authority vested in us, hereby issue the following order:

 With the Declaration of a State of Emergency by the Emergency Management Commission, CEM-20-03-11, and Public Health Emergency Orders No. 2020-003 and No. 2020-004, the public health state of emergency affecting the Navajo Nation citizens and residents due to confirmation of the spread of the COVID-19 virus in and surrounding the Navajo Nation is extended, as such:

- a. The Navajo Nation Health Command Operations Center shall be staffed throughout the emergency condition under the direction of David Nez, Health Command Center Manager with support from Director, Dr. Jill Jim, Navajo Department of Health; and,
- b. The Navajo Department of Emergency Management Emergency Operation Center shall be activated to support the Navajo Health Command Operations Center; and,
- c. All Navajo Nation Branches, Divisions, Departments, programs, offices, non-certified Chapters, Enterprises, and Navajo casinos shall comply with and adhere to directives, instructions, and/or policies coming from the Navajo Health Command Operations Center as related to addressing COVID-19.
- 2. The Navajo Nation previously issued travel restrictions due to the COVID-19 virus which restricted or canceled all off-reservation travel and directed all Navajo Nation employees to return from current off-reservation travel; however, the COVID-19 virus continues to spread throughout the Navajo Nation. The action of the Navajo Nation and surrounding States, restricting large gatherings and closure of government offices, has had effect on the spread of the COVID-19, as such:
 - a. All Navajo Nation government offices shall remain closed to minimize the spread of the COVID-19 virus. This closure shall extend from April 3, 2020 to April 26, 2020 and only Essential Personnel, as determined by the respective Division Director, shall report to their respective duty stations, including, but not limited to, Navajo Public Safety, Navajo Fire Department, Navajo Emergency Medical Services, Department of Emergency Management, Navajo Division of Natural Resources, Navajo Division of Finance, Navajo Division of Social Services, Navajo Division of Human Services, Department of Diné Education, and those determined by the Branch Chiefs; and,
 - b. All Non-Essential Navajo Nation government employees, including non-governance certified Chapter employees, affected by this Executive Order shall be granted Administrative Leave for the duration of the closure and are expected to refrain from events, gatherings, or other areas where they may contract the COVID-19 virus, and to observe and follow all Public Health Emergency Orders; and,
 - c. The closure of Navajo Nation government offices may be extended beyond April 26, 2020 on the recommendation of the Navajo Health Command Operations Center and the Navajo Department of Emergency Management Operation Center.
- 3. All Navajo Nation Divisions, Departments, Programs, Offices, non-governance certified Chapters, Enterprises, and Navajo casinos shall follow the direction of the

Public Health Emergency Orders requiring all Navajo citizens to limit their movement which means staying at home and leaving for Essential Activities only; and comply with the curfew hours by staying home between the hours of 8:00 P.M. and 5:00 A.M. MDST.

4. The Navajo Nation Board of Education declared an emergency affecting all schools on the Navajo Nation due to the spread of the COVID-19 virus and recommended, among other measures, the closure of all schools and educational facilities on the Navajo Nation to protect our children, their parents, and care givers, NNBEMA-608-2020; in addition, the States of Arizona (H.B. 2910), New Mexico (Executive Order 2020-12), and Utah issued statewide school closure for the remainder of the 2020 school year that affect the Navajo Nation, as such:

We strongly recommend and urge the Navajo Board of Education to extend the closing of the schools and educational facilities for the remainder of this school year which shall include:

- a. Public Law 100-297 grant schools, Public Law 93-638 contract schools, and Bureau of Education operated schools be closed for the remainder of the 2020 school year; and,
- b. Public schools, including grant schools, private schools, higher education institutions, early childhood programs, including CCDF, Head Start, FACE programs, and all after school programs located on the Navajo Nation be closed for the remainder of the 2020 school year; and,
- c. Off reservation residential halls and dormitories for Navajo students operating under the authority of the Navajo Nation will follow the process and procedure for this host school district.

The Navajo Nation Divisions, Departments, Programs, Offices, non-governance certified Chapters, Enterprises, and Navajo casinos are responsible for implementing and ensuring compliance with this order.

The provisions of this order shall be implemented consistent with the laws of the Navajo Nation and in a manner that advances the highest welfare of the People.

Non-Governance Certified Chapter Staff as Essential Employees

On March 13, 2020, President Nez and Vice-President Lizer issued Executive Order No. 001-20 (EO) which empowered Division Directors to determine "essential personnel." On March 31, 2020, President Nez and Vice-President Lizer issued the second Executive Order (002-20) which, among other things, extended the governmental closure to April 26, 2020. Both EOs provided paid administrative leave to all "non-essential" personnel for the duration of the closure. Further, that the closure could be extended on the recommendation of the Navajo Nation Health Command Operations Center (HCOC). It second EO reaffirmed the Division Director's authority to determine essential personnel. For nongovernance certified Chapters, all Community Services Coordinators (CSC) and Account Maintenance Specialist (AMS) are Executive Branch employees for purposes of the Local Governance Act.

Effective Monday April 13, 2020, all CSCs and AMSs are deemed as essential employees. This does not mean that Chapters are re-opening. In fact, Chapters are to remain closed to the public. These employees will be providing "Essential Government Functions" and assisting with the implementation of the Emergency Navajo Nation Chapter Plan. All 110 Navajo Chapters are approved for the following essential government services:

- water hauling services
- solid waste management services
- coal/wood/hay services
- food and supply storage
- food and supply delivery services
- U.S. mail services (if located at the Chapter)
- administrative emergency documents
- Other essential services will be determined on a case by case basis and as the situation changes with the COVID-19 emergency response.

As provided in the Emergency Public Health Orders, all emergency relief efforts by any of the 110 Chapters need to be coordinated with the HCOC. At the outset of the establishment of the HCOC, the DCD was placed under the Operations Section of the HCOC. Thus, there is a "Chapter Branch" under HCOC which is facilitated by DCD. Therefore, all Chapters including Governance-Certified Chapters, must coordinate all emergency relief efforts through the Chapter Branch of the HCOC.

The Covid-19 virus has demonstrated to be a major public health risk. Thus, any effort by Chapters to provide any Essential Government Functions like those contemplated in the Emergency Navajo Nation Chapter Plan, requires standardization on trainings and implementation in an effort to minimize the risk of exposure to the participants and to the community members they serve.

Notwithstanding the above, all CSC, AMS, and governance-certified Chapter employees shall communicate any "underlying health conditions" as defined under the Public Health Orders which will excuse you from performing any Essential Governmental Functions. Such employees will need to provide in writing and send notice to Sonlatsa Jim-Martin.

All CSC, AMS, and governance-certified Chapter employees shall use all safety measures while at the Chapter facility including wearing gloves, masks, sanitizing surfaces regularly, social distancing of 6-feet, and gathering with no more than 5-people. Once again, all Chapters are to remain closed for regular business with the public due to the spread of the COVID19. PURPOSE

Pursuant to the Executive Order No. 001-20, the Navajo Nation Office of the President and Vice President (OPVP) declared a State of Emergency due to the confirmation of the COVID-19 Virus in areas surrounding the Navajo Nation and closed the Navajo Nation government offices. President Nez extended the closure of the Executive Branch by Executive Order No. 002-20.

Some employees continue to work during the COVID-19 pandemic because of the essential nature of their position to allow the government to continue to operate and provide services to the Navajo People. This includes personnel that are working the front lines of the Navajo Nation government's pandemic response and those employees who are designated by the Division Director or OPVP as "Essential Employees" as directed by Executive Order No. 002-20. As such, they are "on call" for purposes of Section VII(L) of the Personnel Policies Manual.

APPLICABILITY

Pursuant to the authority set out in Section VII(L) of the Personnel Policies Manual, and subject to available funds, full-time and part-time employees who are on call during the COVID-19 Pandemic are eligible for Special Duty Pay. Employees may receive Special Duty Pay while holding a position designated by the Division Director or by the Office of the President and Vice-President to be eligible for such pay. Such positions first must be designated as "Essential Personnel" under Executive Order No. 002-20. The Division Director or OPVP may then apply additional criteria to deem such Essential Personnel eligible for Special Duty Pay, including whether such employees are required by their duties to be physically in their office or in the field directly responding to the pandemic.

DEFINITIONS

Special Duty Pay: For purposes of these procedures, "Special Duty Pay" means additional

pay for being on call and performing essential government services during

the COVID-19 pandemic.

Hours Worked: The time an employee spends on the work premises or at a designated work

place performing services of benefit to the Navajo Nation, including

documented work performed while telecommuting.

PROCEDURES

Subject to available funds, Special Duty Pay will be paid for all hours worked from the date of the issuance of the Executive Order No. 001-02, until the Navajo Nation government is reopened by Executive Order of the President.

Special Duty Pay will not be paid when the employee is on Leave Without Pay, including because of a suspension arising out of disciplinary action, unless that disciplinary action is reversed by the Office of Hearings and Appeals or the Navajo Supreme Court.

For non-exempt employees, as defined by the Navajo Nation Personnel Policies Manual, Special Duty Pay shall be calculated as one-and one-half times the employee's usual hourly pay rate, as stated on the employee's current Personnel Action Form.

For Exempt Employees, the Division Director or OPVP may approve a lump sum payment in an amount within their discretion, subject to available funds.

 What is the criteria to be approved for a new home/how will recipients be selected? Please be specific, and include any family size and income limitations, as well as any other specific needs of the intended recipients.

The client has to be a registered voter, social security, documentation from other Agencies verifying individual housing needs. The selected recipient selection is based on being a high-risk client's illness under medical care, elderly limited physical mobility, veterans, clients living in old houses built in 1960s beyond repair. The Chapter does a home assessment and Chapter Coordinator determines if client is listed on new home list. The Chapter will work with Senior Center and Head Start Center data as who needs help with their housing needs to verify selection.

The housing choice with the Smith Lake Chapter based on the community members has various family size and very low-income families, the elderly, and the disabled to afford decent, safe, and decent housing. Because many families' member who needs a place to stay, it is not common for generations to live in a single household, many in a two-bedroom home.

The Chapter Administration accepts and review housing applications. The recipients will have to provide their homesite leases, plat survey, archeological, and environmental clarences.

2. Please explain how the cost estimates was determined and how BITCO was selected as the contractor.

The Chapter Administration did not specifically not select as our contractor. Bitco is an alternative and they gave the Chapter the courtesy of drafting the cost estimates. The Chapter will further look into a company that will provide more new homes for our community. The cost will matter and the size of the homes for our recipients.

3. Please describe how the estimated size and cost per home compares to homes in the area.

The homes in the Smith Lake area are 8 ft. height 26X30 in general a substandard housing. The housing assistance programs within the Navajo Nation builds for people in need of housing as a basic homestyle with kitchen, living room and the one or two-bedroom houses. It depends on the number of people in the household. The estimated cost would be an average cost of 40,000 to 50,000.

Currently the cost of housing material has double due to the pandemic it is more for the same type of homes built by the other housing programs. The estimated cost of a simple basic home would be 80,000 to 90,000. Which the Chapter request with ARPA fundings will only buy two homes.

4. If known, please explain whether the home construction projects would qualify for any federally funded housing programs, including but not limited to the national Housing Trust Fund, Indian Housing Block Grant Program, the Indian Community Development Block Grant program, or the BIA Housing Improvement Program. No, federally funded program that provides housing assistance through new construction to the needy Navajo families living in substandard housing and have no other resource for housing assistance.

The funding we proposed is for the ARPA funds. Which to serve at least 5 or 6 applicants from the Smith Lake community.



- 14. We need a bold solution to allow critical infrastructure projects that benefit the Navajo people to move forward and meet funding deadlines, while still respecting the rights and concerns of the Grazing Permittees; and
- 15. The most effective solution to this problem is to enact legislation that allows the Navajo Nation to approve TAAs and/or ROW consents in a timely manner to benefit Navajo people and chapters; and
- 16. A putential legislative solution for the Resources and Development Committee (RDC) to consider by enactment of legislation is a situation, where Grazing Permittees cannot be found or are unwilling to give consents under the following conditions:
 - A. The project must provide a public benefit to the Navajo people, such as water and power supply and distribution, service line extensions, or economic/community development; and
 - B. The Project Sponsorts) shall document their efforts to reach out to the Grazing Permittee(s) prior to construction to give them the apportunity to ask questions and voice their concerns, how contact/notification was made, why consent was not obtained, and what effort was made to mediate peacemaking efforts; and
 - C. Reasonable efforts typically consist, at the minimum, of at least three (3) attempt to contact permittees by phone, email, mail and/or person; and
 - D. The Grazing Permittee shall have thirty (30) days to respond to the project sponsor and, in the absence of such a response, they shall be deemed to have waived any objection to the project.
 - E. A Grazing Permittee not having an updated tally count or who is otherwise out of compliance with the grazing lease cannot raise objection; and
 - F. There shall be at least one (1) peacemaking session with an elected official to allow the Grazing Permittee to state his/her grounds for the objection or to reach an agreement; and
 - G. If an infrastructure project traverses more than one (1) grazing permit, obtaining consent form 50% or more of the grazing permittees affected by the overall project shall be deemed sufficient for project approval. Consent for every single grazing permit shall not be required. If an infrastructure project traverses only one (1) grazing permit, consent from the grazing permittee(s) shall not be required; and
 - H. The Project Sponsor(s), Chapter officials and their designces shall be authorized to obtain consent signatures: and
 - I. This option/waiver is only for infrastructure projects, such as water, wastewater, electric, telecommunications, that benefit the Navajo people, and shall apply regardless of project funding source; and
 - J. This policy shall not apply to projects such as oil and gas or other projects that do not benefit the Navajo people.
 - K. This streamline policy shall "sunset" on December 31", 2026, unless extended by RDC.
- 17. This option would provide the following benefits:
 - A. Expedite delivery of basic and life-essential services to the Navajo people; and
 - B. Meet stringent funding deadlines to avoid loss of funding; and
 - C. Streamline administrative processes for a specific time to achieve completion of necessary and essential basic infrastructure to the Navajo people; and
 - D. Create jobs for Navajo people by getting projects into construction; and
 - E. Respecting rights of Grazing Permittee(s) by employing appropriate communication and attempts to obtain consent for the delivery of basic infrastructure to existing homesteads, with the understanding that certain waivers may result due to non-consent.

It fits into category 3 due to the community people in need of housing renovations and hiring staff under Smith Lake Chapter. The Chapter has requested the amount of \$300.000 towards public sector workforce to help the community home renovation project.

During COVID-19, the Smith Lake community suffered acutely, as much of it was without basic infrastructure like for example housing. The community suffered sharply from the pandemic. The crisis has the Smith Lake Chapter operating in a context of radical uncertainty, and faced with difficult trade-offs given the health, housing, economic and social challenges.

Many community members are associated with poor housing conditions plays a role in the spread of the virus; it is that our community people are determined by the pre-existing

health conditions (e.g., high blood pressure, obesity, and diabetes), which themselves tend to be correlated to income in quality.

These include elderly, those with chronic or long-term illnesses, the poor and low-income families, the homeless, unemployment, youth, students and children at risk, people with disabilities.

The COVID-19 crisis is prompting employers to extend working opportunities where possible, leading to Smith Lake community in housing renovation infrastructures that could bring some long-term benefits. Those unable to work, either because they are working on the front line and exposed to infection, or because their workplaces have closed and lost their jobs.

The Chapter Administration has discretion to which public employment project(s) (PEP) to pursue to all Navajo Nation and applicable federal laws. The Chapter will determine the length of each housing renovation projects and when to begin. All projects will be within the Public Sector Workforce approved budget through ARPA funds The Chapter will make proper accounting and book keeping entries for all PEP allocations and expenditures. The wages will be determined by the Chapter the hourly, FICA, Medicare, Federal Tax Withholding, Unemployment and workman's compensation. The purpose the policy is a guideline from the Chapter. It reduces unemployment rate at both the Chapter and Navajo Nation: (see proof attached).

- Higher average pay
- Flexible work hours
- Helping renovating community homes
- Availability of staff training

The housing renovation, which is for repairing, renovating, or replacing existing housing and for providing housing assistance. Smith Lake Chapter initiative, is to promote the stability and security of community families.

Showing how the Chapter responses or local actions address specific concerns will help communities believe that their wellbeing is valued and their needs addressed.

Examples of responses to community members' concerns have included introducing home renovation guarantees to allow safer environment. As a Smith Lake member the Chapter will move to establish a brighter future which will provide enrichment and hope.

- 14. We need a bold solution to allow critical infrastructure projects that benefit the Navajo people to move forward and meet funding deadlines, while still respecting the rights and concerns of the Grazing Permittees; and
- 15. The most effective solution to this problem is to enact legislation that allows the Navajo Nation to approve TAAs and/or ROW consents in a timely manner to benefit Navajo people and chapters; and
- 16. A potential legislative solution for the Resources and Development Committee (RDC) to consider by enactment of legislation is a situation, where Grazing Permittees cannot be found or are unwilling to give consents under the following conditions:
 - A. The project must provide a public benefit to the Navajo people, such as water and power supply and distribution, service line extensions, or economic/community development; and
 - B. The Project Sponsor(s) shall document their efforts to reach out to the Grazing Permittee(s) prior to construction to give them the opportunity to ask questions and voice their concerns, how contact/notification was made, why consent was not obtained, and what effort was made to mediate peacemaking efforts; and
 - C. Reasonable efforts typically consist, at the minimum, of at least three (3) attempt to contact permittees by phone, email, mail and/or person; and
 - D. The Grazing Permittee shall have thirty (30) days to respond to the project sponsor and, in the absence of such a response, they shall be deemed to have waived any objection to the project.
 - E. A Grazing Permittee not having an updated tally count or who is otherwise out of compliance with the grazing lease cannot raise objection; and
 - F. There shall be at least one (1) peacemaking session with an elected official to allow the Grazing Permittee to state his/her grounds for the objection or to reach an agreement; and
 - G. If an infrastructure project traverses more than one (1) grazing permit, obtaining consent form 50% or more of the grazing permittees affected by the overall project shall be deemed sufficient for project approval. Consent for every single grazing permit shall not be required. If an infrastructure project traverses only one (1) grazing permit, consent from the grazing permittee(s) shall not be required; and
 - H. The Project Sponsorts), Chapter officials and their designees shall be authorized to obtain consent signatures; and
 - I. This option waiver is only for infrastructure projects, such as water, wastewater, electric, telecommunications, that benefit the Navajo people, and shall apply regardless of project funding source; and
 - J. This policy shall not apply to projects such as oil and gas or other projects that do not benefit the Navajo people.
 - K. This streamline policy shall "sunset" on December 31", 2026, unless extended by RDC.
- 17. This option would provide the following benefits:
 - A. Expedite delivery of basic and life-essential services to the Navajo people; and
 - B. Meet stringent funding deadlines to avoid loss of funding: and
 - C. Streamline administrative processes for a specific time to achieve completion of necessary and essential basic infrastructure to the Navajo people; and
 - D. Create jobs for Navajo people by getting projects into construction; and
 - E. Respecting rights of Grazing Permittee(s) by employing appropriate communication and attempts to obtain consent for the delivery of basic infrastructure to existing homesteads, with the understanding that certain waivers may result due to non-consent.



- Smith Lake Chapter is a duly recognized and certified local government of the Navajo Nation Government, pursuant to 26 N.N.C. Local Governance Act, under Section 1, whereas the Navajo Nation Council Delegates to Chapters governmental authority with respect to local matters consistent with Navajo law, including custom and tradition, and other enactments stated within this law.
- 2. The Smith Lake Chapter membership recognizes the requested amendments from the Navajo Nation Department of Justice (DOJ) and Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund Office (NNFRF) to the previously approved ARPA Resolution No. SLC-10/2022-001 REQUESTING THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL RESOURCES & DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE (RDC) TO APPROVE & ENACT LEGISLATION TO AUTHORIZE CONSENT FOR INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS FUNDED BY ARPA/NNFRF & OTHER FUNDING SOURCES THAT WILL BENEFIT & MEET THE BASIC NECESSITIES OF HOUSING, WATER, POWER & TELECOMMUNICATIONS FOR NAVAJO PEOPLE. On October 21st, 2022, this resolution passed by a vote of 17 in favor, 0 opposed, and 2 abstained.
- 3. Smith Lake Chapter was allocated \$1,467,056.67 under the Navajo Nation Council Legislation CJN-29-22 for Chapter and Regional Projects; and
- 4. Smith Lake Chapter established and prioritized four (4) Delegate Regional Expenditure Plans in accordance with the NNFRFO and the Division of Community Development (DCD) policies; and

WHEREAS:

- Smith Lake Chapter is a duly recognized and certified local government of the Navajo Nation Government, pursuant to 26 N.N.C. Local Governance Act, under Section 1, whereas the Navajo Nation Council Delegates to Chapters governmental authority with respect to local matters consistent with Navajo law, including custom and tradition, and other enactments stated within this law.
- 2. Many Navajo chapters are in dire need of housing, water, electricity, broadband, and other infrastructure to meet the necessities to develop projects that are directly connected to rural homes across the Navajo Nation; and
- 3. The 24th Navajo Nation Council has appropriated over one (1) billion dollars in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds (NNFRF) and Sihasin Funds for the construction of infrastructure projects; and
- These NNFRF/ARPA funds have strict deadlines under the U.S. Treasury's Final Rule and must be fully expended by December 31st, 2026, and encumbered by December 31st, 2024, with all ARPA-NNFRF funds fully spent by June 30th, 2026; and
- 5. Other funding sources, such as Bureau of Reclamation, New Mexico Capital Outlay, and Tribal Infrastructure Funds, and other local, state, and federal funding are planned to be used in conjunction with ARPA-NNFRF and Sihasin Funds for projects and have similarly strict funding deadlines. Any funds not encumbered and spent by these deadlines will be lost; and
- 6. The single largest delay in the execution of infrastructure projects is typically acquisition of Right-Of-Way (ROW)/Tribal Authorization Access (TAA); and
- Acquiring ROW/TAA in an efficient and simplified manner for the time-sensitive ARPA-NNFRF funded projects is of
 the utmost urgency and necessity these projects include buried water and sewer lines, overhead electric and
 telecommunication lines, and equipment, such as pumps, wells, towers, and tanks that do not significantly impact grazing
 permitted area; and
- 8. The biggest source of delays and risks in the ROW/TAA process on tribal lands is typically obtaining consent from the Grazing Permittee(s); and
- 9. Under the current Navajo Nation policy, a singe Grazing Permittee can deny ROW/TAA for a project on tribal lands where they have a grazing permit. Grazing Permittees have expanded this use privilege of grazing lease to effectively absolute veto power over a project that may be needed and supported by the entire community. Even if a Grazing Permittee eventually gives consent, it can delay the project leading to loss of funding; and
- 10. Optional paragraph for BBN9 Chapters, including Smith Lake, Casamero Lake, Thoreau and Baca Chapters: As an example, BBN9 is a major federally funded waterline project that will provide renewable water supply to Coyote Canyon, Tse'ii'ahi, Nahodishgish, Crownpoint, Becenti, Lake Valley, White Rock and Littlewater. A few individual Grazing Permittees are allowed to stop BBN9 waterline by not giving consent. Thousands of Navajo homes, businesses, and communities will be denied good source of water; and
- 11. Livestock grazing is an important part of Navajo tradition, culture, and livelihood. The rights and concerns of Grazing Permittees are important and needed to be respected, while balancing this against development; and
- 12. Unlike oil and gas or mining projects, public benefit utilities, such as underground water, sewer lines, overhead powerlines, and communication lines, do not permanently affect grazeable land because the lands are still available for grazing after construction is completed. In fact, the lands are required to be re-seeded after construction; and
- 13. Supporting equipment needed to operate water systems, such as pumps, wells, and tanks, do not significantly impact grazing because these facilities utilize minimal land (typically ½ acre or less) and would have negligible impacts on grazing lease stocking rate established in the grazing lease agreement for the identified range unit; and

- 14. We need a bold solution to allow critical infrastructure projects that benefit the Navajo people to move forward and meet funding deadlines, while still respecting the rights and concerns of the Grazing Permittees; and
- 15. The most effective solution to this problem is to enact legislation that allows the Navajo Nation to approve TAAs and/or ROW consents in a timely manner to benefit Navajo people and chapters; and
- 16. A potential legislative solution for the Resources and Development Committee (RDC) to consider by enactment of legislation is a situation, where Grazing Permittees cannot be found or are unwilling to give consents under the following conditions:
 - A. The project must provide a public benefit to the Navajo people, such as water and power supply and distribution, service line extensions, or economic/community development; and
 - B. The Project Sponsor(s) shall document their efforts to reach out to the Grazing Permittee(s) prior to construction to give them the opportunity to ask questions and voice their concerns, how contact/notification was made, why consent was not obtained, and what effort was made to mediate peacemaking efforts; and
 - C. Reasonable efforts typically consist, at the minimum, of at least three (3) attempt to contact permittees by phone, email, mail and/or person; and
 - D. The Grazing Permittee shall have thirty (30) days to respond to the project sponsor and, in the absence of such a response, they shall be deemed to have waived any objection to the project.
 - E. A Grazing Permittee not having an updated tally count or who is otherwise out of compliance with the grazing lease cannot raise objection; and
 - F. There shall be at least one (1) peacemaking session with an elected official to allow the Grazing Permittee to state his/her grounds for the objection or to reach an agreement; and
 - G. If an infrastructure project traverses more than one (1) grazing permit, obtaining consent form 50% or more of the grazing permittees affected by the overall project shall be deemed sufficient for project approval. Consent for every single grazing permit shall not be required. If an infrastructure project traverses only one (1) grazing permit, consent from the grazing permittee(s) shall not be required; and
 - H. The Project Sponsor(s). Chapter officials and their designees shall be authorized to obtain consent signatures; and
 - I. This option/waiver is only for infrastructure projects, such as water, wastewater, electric, telecommunications, that benefit the Navajo people, and shall apply regardless of project funding source; and
 - J. This policy shall not apply to projects such as oil and gas or other projects that do not benefit the Navajo people.
 - K. This streamline policy shall "sunset" on December 31st, 2026, unless extended by RDC.
- 17. This option would provide the following benefits:
 - A. Expedite delivery of basic and life-essential services to the Navajo people; and
 - B. Meet stringent funding deadlines to avoid loss of funding; and
 - C. Streamline administrative processes for a specific time to achieve completion of necessary and essential basic infrastructure to the Navajo people; and
 - D. Create jobs for Navajo people by getting projects into construction; and
 - E. Respecting rights of Grazing Permittee(s) by employing appropriate communication and attempts to obtain consent for the delivery of basic infrastructure to existing homesteads, with the understanding that certain waivers may result due to non-consent.
